Summary of Episode:

Beth Tarleton believes that workers need to be empowered to do their job. She talks about her orientation has always been to look for new ways to train, infuse knowledge and support the workers who support the parents.

Biography:

Beth Tarleton is a senior lecturer at the University of Bristol. She is part of the Norah Fry Centre for Disability Studies within the School for Policy Studies. Beth has been researching positive support for parents with learning disabilities (intellectual disabilities) and milder learning difficulties since 2005. Beth's work provided examples of positive practice included in the English Good Practice Guidance on Working with Parents with a Learning Disability. Beth is co-ordinator of the Working Together with Parents Network which shares positive practice about working with parents with a learning disability/difficulty.
